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
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NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

At first glance, *The Brothers Paranormal* by Prince Gomovilas appears to be a horror-genre play centering two marginalized communities. But actually, Prince brilliantly uses horror to explore the unspoken issues that haunt these communities and the deep cultural practices that connect them. The horror that exists in displacement, mental illness, addiction, and the climate crisis are at the heart of this beautifully constructed play.

I was introduced to Prince's play, while I was the Artistic Director of Theater Mu (an Asian American theater company in the Twin Cities) and the Board President of the Consortium of Asian American Theater and Artists (where I worked closely with Perseverance Artistic Director, Leslie Ishii). I was looking for a project in collaboration with Penumbra Theater (a premier Black theater in the country) and the fact that this play centered the Black/African American and the Thai/Thai American experience was perfect. That production featured Leslie Ishii in the part that she is reviving in this production, so when Leslie asked me to direct it at Perseverance, I knew it was going to be a very special experience.

And directing in Juneau has not disappointed. I'm so proud that this production features three Thai American actors along with a Thai culture consultant. Perseverance Theatre's commitment to decolonizing and indigenizing its producing practices has been a revelation. The talent and the dedication of the design/production team is world class. The COVID protocols and procedures have been thorough and thoughtful, building a safe environment where we can give ourselves fully to the creative process. All in the backdrop of this gorgeous northern state, has allowed me to work with a clear mind connected to the amazing energy of nature and all her elements for maximum economy and focus on what really matters when making art in community.

As you watch the play think about the things that haunt you and what makes it so hard to let them go. Is it personal or systemic? Conscious or unconscious? Real or imaginary? Is it a need-based or fear-based choice? And finally, how do you define HOME and FAMILY?

Thank you so much for completing the process of theater making and being part of this live experience!

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DRAMATURGICAL NOTE

The Brothers Paranormal by Prince Gomolvilas weaves a powerful cross-cultural horror narrative that is grounded in the real-life horrors of the universal human experience. Exploring themes of mental health, internal displacement, and immigration, Gomolvilas confronts audiences with a question: what do we leave behind for those we love?

Thai immigration to the United States reached its peak in 2006, one year after Hurricane Katrina devastated communities of the American South, and one year before the events of *The Brothers Paranormal* take place. Tasanee and her two sons, Max and Visarut, settle in a community whose cultural demographics vary drastically from the community they left behind. They express feelings of loneliness and isolation from other Thai immigrants, most of whom have settled in communities along the West Coast.

Delia and Felix, Black Americans displaced by Hurricane Katrina, drive North in search of a land-locked haven to call home - only for strange events to follow them to the midwest. Felix specifies that the couple hopped on Route 61 to escape the storm, so it makes sense that they too would end up in St. Louis. With a Black residents accounting 44.9% of the population, it would make sense that Delia and Felix are able to feel a sense of community that Tasanee and her family do not.

Despite a sense of isolation felt by the Thai protagonists in *The Brothers Paranormal*, there exists a historical precedent of solidarity amongst Black and Asian communities in the United States. As early as 1869, abolitionist Frederick Douglass argued on behalf of Chinese immigration to America in his "Composite Nation" speech. He advocated for free migration and emphasized equality and human rights for the earliest Asian immigrants. As time moved on, Black communities were some of the loudest opponents of the Vietnam War, naming that their own communities were disproportionately impacted by the draft: 64% of all eligible Black Americans were drafted, as opposed to 31% of eligible White Americans. Black men also had a casualty rate twice that of White men between 1965 to 1966. The Vietnam War marked the start of significant Thai immigration to the United States. On a micro scale, the story of these two families models the power of solidarity and community building that has liberated Black and Asian American communities in the ways we can observe today.


As of 2019, 49% of Americans reported believing in ghosts of some sort. Nearly everyone knows of at least one person who describes seeing or hearing something that they couldn't quite explain - the concept of haunting is universal. Regardless of the beliefs of any individual, there is now scientific evidence that explains the physical manifestations of what haunts many of us. Heart disease, diabetes, and schizophrenia are just a few of the ailments that exist as a result of what is referred to as "weathering" - the physical, mental, and emotional toll that socioeconomic adversity, political marginalization, and racial trauma has on the bodies of the

global majority. We also know now that the impacts of racial trauma can continue to live on in the genetics of descendents.

The Brothers Paranormal asks audiences to consider what they leave behind, but has a message of encouragement: what are we doing to demonstrate solidarity with our neighbors, and what can we do - as neighbors, friends, and siblings - to interrupt the cycle? Whether you're hunting ghosts of your own, or taking the first steps your family has ever taken in a new land, one thing will always ring true: human beings are strongest when we work together.

Nina Agelvis (Lighting Designer) is a freelance lighting designer, draftsman, and programmer currently based in Cincinnati, Ohio. She recently graduated with her MFA in Lighting Design & Technology, at CCM-University of Cincinnati. She graduated from the University of California, Irvine with a BA in Drama and Honors in Lighting Design. Her most recent work was designing the production of *Pride & Prejudice* at the Cincinnati Shakespeare Company in February of 2020. Recently she has started working with Quantum Creative Studios as an Assistant Designer, and at Lori's Roadhouse as a Lighting Director for their weekly concert shows. 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
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PROFILES

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
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PROFILES

Elizabeth Lynn Rakphongphairoj Kilrain (Jai) is a vernacular dancer and educator specialising in African Diasporic dances through her organisation, Blue Note San Diego. When not on stage or the dance floor, she is a software engineer at SOCi, Inc. in San Diego and runs a jewellery design business called Ouen 6324 Designs, with the mission of normalising a non-Western aesthetic and promoting cross-cultural understanding.

Vivian Melde (Delia) first stepped on stage in Anchorage as a dancer with the Anchorage Civic Ballet 1967. In 1972, she participated in summer workshop with the Louisville Children's Theatre, performing in a contemporary montage of Shakespeare. While attending the University of Louisville, Vivian joined Fleet Street Dance Company, a modern dance company. Since the late 1970s, Vivian performed with Anchorage Community Theatre, ACT Dance Ensemble, Alaska Contemporary Dance Company, Theatre Guild, Alaska Light Opera Theatre, and Anchorage Festival Theatre. She made her directorial debut at the original Cyrano's on 4th and D, when Eccentric Theatre's Jerry Harper asked her to direct Ntoze Shange's *for colored girls who have considered suicide/when the rainbow is enuf.* From 2016-2019, Vivian directed a one-woman show, that traveled to Victoria, BC, Seward, Amsterdam, Nova Scotia, and Nome. From 2019, she was a principal player with the Saturday Storytelling Theater at the Anchorage Museum, until pandemic restrictions closed the improvisational shows. In 2020, Vivian played the role of Mother in a psychological thriller film called *The Apex*, which is in production. In May of 2021, she played a witch in the film "*I Die You Live* by Joe Hamilton.

Makayla Michael (Stage Manager) is a graduate of Wright State University in Dayton, OH. Since then, she has worked on plays, musicals, and operas across the country. Most recently she was the Stage Manager for *A Christmas Story, Footloose, A Gentleman's Guide, The Little Mermaid,* and *Sound of Music* at LaComedia Dinner Theatre in Dayton, Ohio. Other credits include *Application Pending & Home* with CATCO in Columbus, Ohio, *Salome* with Dayton Opera in Ohio, and *Faust* with Opera Omaha in Nebraska. She began her career with internships at the Hangar Theatre in Ithaca, New York and Central City Opera in Colorado. She is very excited to be in Alaska and working with Perseverance Theatre to bring this show to audiences. Stay healthy and enjoy the show!

Jared Olin (Assistant Director) is Tl'eeyegge Hut'aane (Koyukon Athabascan), and grew up in Galena, Alaska. He trained at the University of Utah BFA Actor Training Program, where he received the 2015 Distinguished Alumni Award, and The Juilliard School.

Shelly Wright (Costume Designer) is a versatile costume designer whose work includes theatre, dance, and opera. She has created many characters while designing for children's theatre, Alaska professional theatre, and many different community performing organizations. She believes that as a successful costume designer she takes the story, characters, and historical facts, and translates them through an emotional and artistic lens. Shelly began sewing and making artwork at a young age. In her early twenties was designing costumes for children's theatre, school productions and sewing clothing for herself and her children. She is self-taught and her specialty is custom design for live theatre and fashion. Her greatest satisfaction comes from seeing the joy on the faces of the actors wearing the costumes she has created, the brides wearing the dress she has fashioned and you, the audience watching this great performance tonight.

Perseverance is committed to creating theatre that represents all that is great about Alaska, and to bringing great live theatre to our Alaskan audiences.

Perseverance Theatre believes theatre-going creates shared experiences for our communities, which foster empathy, build relationships, and cultivate communication skills, and in the process better equip us all to solve problems together and create more vital and just communities.

In 1979, Molly Smith founded Perseverance Theatre, following her dream of starting a professional theatre company in her hometown. Over forty years, Perseverance has grown to serve 20,000 audience members, in both Juneau and in Anchorage, employ over 400 artists, and engage 300 volunteers annually to produce a season of classical, contemporary, and world premiere productions on our stages.

Perseverance believes that professional theatres play a vital role in training and cultivating the next generation of artists and audiences. The theatre's education department produces extensive education and training programs, including Summer Theatre Arts Rendezvous (STAR), mainstage student matinees, and season-long internships.

Perseverance has premiered more than 70 new plays by Alaskan and national playwrights. Perseverance has a national profile, known for its commitment to developing artists and engaging programming reflective of the highly diverse communities of Alaska, to deliver the finest professional theatre anywhere to our loyal and local audiences.
