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






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




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NOTE FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Perseverance Theatre Comes Home to Fun Home to Close our 43rd Season!

It is with great joy that we welcome you to our production of *Fun Home* adapted by the Tony-Award-Winning playwright and composing team, Lisa Kron and Jeanine Tessori!

Fun fact: Fun Home is adapted from Alison Bechdel's 2006 graphic memoir of the same name.

We were clear that when the Covid-19 pandemic shuttered our production of *Fun Home* in March of 2020, we would bring this important work back to our stage and here we are! This season represents our staff's wholehearted perseverance.

More Fun Facts: *Fun Home* is the first Broadway musical with a Lesbian protagonist and our stage director, Hannah Wolf, is one of very few Lesbian female directors to direct this musical in the American Theatre. This production also marks the first time that Perseverance Theatre is centering an LGBTQ+ story and its Alaska LGBTQ+ artists and communities on its mainstage. After being closed and working remotely/virtually, we had to come home for *Fun Home*.

Even more Fun Facts: Again, I proudly lift-up the leadership of born and raised Juneau-ite, Hannah Wolf, who celebrates a twenty-year relationship with Perseverance! I also proudly lift-up the LGBTQ+ cast, crew, musicians, and staff who are

also supported by the leadership of Gary Busby, Maestro/ Musical Director, Joseph Biagini, Associate Producer, ErinMarie Suscheck, Stage Manager, and Sarah Brownstein, Assistant Stage Manager.

During rehearsals, I had the honor of witnessing Hannah's "joy practice," where the company took turns to invite each other to play and engage in what brings them joy-from dance parties to meditation to sharing their art to playing hide 'n seek and more. This practice brought laughter and creative freedom that illuminated even more the dark humor and the pain of *Fun Home*'s characters' unconscious/ conscious unfulfillment. Experiencing the vulnerabilities and deep revelations of these complex characters, we witness the societal repression that a mainstream heteronormative stipulates of LGBTQ+ Peoples. Lisa Kron and Jeanine Tessori profoundly reveal this depth of loss and the high cost of internalized homophobia at this time when legislation and the dominant culture continues to threaten lives and take away the human rights of our LGBTQ+ communities.

So, I must ask myself these questions: In my heart, where am I repressed because I'm afraid of being vulnerable? How does this unconsciously/consciously dehumanize the LGBTQ+ community because what was/is normal is changing? Does this make me unconsciously/consciously complicit with expecting all to live in a binary world—in the rigid rules

of bygone heteronormativity because it's "normal and how we've always done?"

More Questions: How can I use my privilege for good to foster a culture where myself and others can be their full selves—fully human 100% of the time? I can start with deepening my listening and respect for how my family members, neighbors, classmates, colleagues identify. I also pledge to use the pronouns they have shared for me to respectfully refer to them.

As you have done by engaging in our production of Fun Home, we must continue our learning about the challenges, heartbreaks, and triumphs of the LGBTQ+ Community. We must keep learning together and support each other's vulnerabilities for greater actions and accountability towards the needed changes that the LGBTQ+ Communities aspire to accomplish.

Perseverance looks forward to continuing to use our stage and platforms to center the stories of our most

us as we evolve
our learning and

and effective advocacy, so we produce theatre to engage and experience each other as fully human 100% of the time.

My heartfelt gratitude to you, our audience, and all of our donors and supporters, as a voyager with us through this season and through this unprecedented time as we are paranormally haunted by all that is pressing globally and at home. Your tremendous support has kept us alive and continuing to recover through this pandemic!

For sharing your brilliant artistry and vulnerabilities, my deepest Japanese bow to all of the creative teams, casts, crew, musicians, and the Alaska Native/Indigenous, Black and Thai Communities, the LGBTQ+ Community and our mighty staff of this season. Your vulnerability helps each of us to grow our trust in one another that sows transformative societal change. We keep making theatre because it can and will free us collectively.

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
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Thank you for gathering with us to bear witness to this unlikely musical, a dark comedy based on the graphic memoir by Alison Bechdel. It's an honor to share in person space with you!

There are universal touchstones in this very specific family story. At the heart, it's about unraveling a family secret and a daughter working to free herself from Bruce's (her father) shadow. Alison is 43, the same age as Bruce when he died, and she must find the truth of his life to begin her story. Alison and Bruce grew up queer in the same small town, a place where it can be hard to redefine

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yourself in front of your neighbors and community. This is a story that asks us all to take the risk of being vulnerable, of being seen, and attempting to shake loose the shame that can hold us down. Fun Home is the first Tony Award winning musical to center a lesbian character. I grew up closeted in Juneau, not seeing myself in media and afraid of being different. It's hard to live authentically, especially in a small town, but it's equally hard to pretend to be someone you're not. The act of being authentic and visible requires a level of bravery that Bruce can't muster, and that Medium Alison is just starting to find. It is a gift to explore the vulnerability and courage that authenticity takes here in Juneau.

Alison uses her art, her writing, and drawing to process and heal these deep wounds. Her art helps her organize the chaos of her life, her guilt, and her grief. My own father passed away at the end of February, right before we started rehearsals. This musical is an architecturally



complex and finely calibrated representation of the grief spiral. When somehow we are simultaneously ourselves at multiple ages, remembering our person. It's been a trip to spend my days combing through my own father's objects and spend my evenings watching Alison parse out her memories of Bruce. The question I asked myself at the start of rehearsals was, how can this collaboration, this show, and this story aid in the healing process. No matter the story you carry with you, can these characters and their arc aid in your processing?

Two years ago, I was writing the first draft of this director's note. We were a week away from opening, and in a blink of an eye, everything changed. This is also a story about the work that Alison does to become unstuck. After the events of the past two years, I return to this story to teach me how to approach my blocks and fears head-on. This musical is about how you need an end to have a beginning. The question I invite you all to ask with me is: What are the things (personal and systemic) that we all need to unlock to move forward into healing, creation, and joy?

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Jeanine Tesori (music) has written a diverse catalog for Broadway, opera, film and television. Her Broadway musicals include: Fun Home (2015 Tony Award Winner, Pulitzer finalist); Violet; Caroline, or Change; Shrek the Musical; Thoroughly Modern Millie; Twelfth Night (LCT); John Guare's A Free Man of Color. Delacorte: Mother Courage (starring Meryl Streep). She has received five Tony nominations, three Obie Awards and three Drama Desk Awards. The hallmarks of her work have been described as "close-to-the-surface emotion, structural rigor and rhythmic drive."

Her operas include: *The Lion, the Unicorn and Me* and *Blizzard on Marblehead Neck* (MET/LCT Opera/Theater and Glimmerglass Opera commission); her upcoming collaboration with Tazewell Thompson, Blue, was commissioned for Glimmerglass Opera company and will premiere there next season. She wrote the musical featured in the 2016 revival of *Gilmore Girls* and has also written special material for artists such as The Girl in

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14G for Kristin Chenoweth and has been featured in the documentaries Show Business and Theater of War. Jeanine Tesori became the founding Artistic Director of a new concert series at New York City Center called Encores! Off-Center, for which she has helmed seasons joined by artists such as Stephen Sondheim, Lin Manuel-Miranda, Randy Newman, William Finn, Alan Menken, Renee Elise Goldsberry, Sutton Foster and Jonathan Groff. After producing four seasons of Off-Center concerts, she took one of those concerts, Sunday in the Park with George (starring Jake Gyllenhaal) to Broadway where she produced the 2017 revival, with ATG and Riva Marker. She was the recording producer for Sunday as well as the Original Cast Recordings of Violet; Caroline, or Change;

A lecturer in music at Yale and on faculty at Columbia University, Tesori has spoken and taught at universities and programs all over the country. She is the founding Creative Director of the non-profit A BroaderWay, an arts empowerment program for young women. She was given the Einhorn Mentorship Award by Primary Stages for her exceptional work with young artists. Her daughter, Siena Rafter, is a sophomore at Brown University.

Lisa Kron (Book and Lyrics) Lisa Kron is a writer and performer whose work has been widely produced in New

York, regionally, and internationally. Her plays include Well, 2.5 Minute Ride and The Ver**zon Play. She wrote the book and lyrics for the musical *Fun Home* (with music by composer Jeanine Tesori), winner of five 2015 Tony Awards including Best Musical. Lisa and Jeanine were the first all-woman team to ever receive a Tony for best score. As an actor Lisa was most recently seen as Mrs. Mi-Tzu and Mrs. Yang in the Foundry Theater's acclaimed production of Good Person of Szechuan (Lortel Award, Outstanding Featured Actress). Honors include a Guggenheim fellowship, a Doris Duke Performing Artists Award, and the Cal Arts/Alpert Award. She is a proud founding member of the OBIE- and Bessie-Awardwinning collaborative theater company The Five Lesbian Brothers.

Lisa currently serves as Secretary of the Dramatists Guild Council and on the boards of the McDowell Colony and the Lilly Awards.

Alison Bechdel (author of the original graphic memoir) Alison's comic strip *Dykes To Watch Out For* became a countercultural institution among lesbians and discerning non-lesbians all over the planet. And her more recent, darkly humorous graphic memoirs about her family have forged an unlikely intimacy with an even wider range of readers.

Bechdel self-syndicated *Dykes to Watch Out For* for twenty-five years, from 1983 to 2008. The award-winning generational chronicle has been called "one of the pre-eminent oeuvres in the comics genre, period." (Ms. magazine)

In 2006 she published *Fun Home: A Family Tragicomic*. Time magazine named it the Best Book of 2006. It was adapted into a musical by the playwright Lisa Kron and the composer Jeanine Tesori. It opened on Broadway at the Circle in the Square Theater on April 19, 2015, and won five Tony Awards, including "Best Musical." In her work, Bechdel is preoccupied with the overlap of

the political and the personal spheres, the relationship of the self to the world outside. Her 2012 memoir *Are You My Mother?* A Comic Drama delved into not just her relationship with her own mother, but the theories of the 20th century British psychoanalyst Donald Winnicott. Her most recent book, *The Secret to Superhuman Strength* (May 2021), continues her investigation of the relationship between inside and outside, in this case the outside where she skis, bikes, hikes, and wanders in pursuit of fitness and, incidentally, self-transcendence. Alison's comics have appeared in The New Yorker, Slate, McSweeney's, The New York Times Book Review, and Granta. She has been awarded Guggenheim and

MacArthur Fellowships. She lives up a hill in Vermont.





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Rio Alberto (He/They) (Roy/Pete/Mark/Bobby/Jeremy Understudy) is a Chicano actor, director, producer, educator, and current Artistic Director of Spokane Ensemble Theatre. Born and raised on Yakama lands, they are the current Director of Marketing and Community Engagement at Perseverance Theatre. Most recently onstage with Spokane Playwright's Laboratory in *Minimum Wage*, a new play by Dahveed Bullis, other notable roles include Yinaahaat in the world premiere of *Devilfish* by Vera Starbard and directed by Leslie Ishii, and Tom Collins in *Rent*, directed by leff Sanders.

Axel Boily (John Bechdel) is 12 years old and in 6th grade at Dzantik'i Heeni Middle School. He discovered acting with Perseverance's Young Company, performing in *Norse Mythology* and *Disco Alice*. Axel studies piano with Rob Cohen and clarinet at school, and is looking forward to going to Sitka Fine Arts Camp for the first time this summer. Axel thinks it's important for everyone to know



that acting is fun, but it's also hard work and a great job! But for now he's thinking he might become an architect. He thanks his big sister, Clare, for being his creative inspiration, and the cast and crew of *Fun Home* for making this such a great experience in both 2020 and 2022!

Enrique Bravo (Bruce Bechdel) has had the pleasure of performing in Juneau, Alaska since 2006. He is a founding member of both Theater Alaska and Generator Theater and has worked with Perseverance Theatre in over 30 productions. He was the Actor-In-Residence at Perseverance Theatre from 2013-2019 where he also received the Bishop Michael Kenny Award in recognition of long-term commitment to great artistry in the Theatre. Regionally he has worked at Harlequin Theatre, Seattle Repertory, New York Theatre Festival, ENACT Theatre, Colonial Theatre, Bridgework Theatre, Mcleod Summer Playhouse, Austin Shakespeare, Blue Theatre, and FronteraFest. He received his BFA in Regional Theatre from Webster Conservatory in St. Louis, MO and his MFA in Theatre from the University of Texas in Austin.

Sarah Brownstein (She/Her) (Assistant Stage Manager) is a recent graduate from Sarah Lawrence College, an aspiring stage manager, director, and playwright, and is delighted to join Perseverance Theatre as the production/stage management apprentice and the assistant stage manager for *Fun Home*. She has previously acted as assistant stage

manager for Chester Theatre Company, stage managed for the Melancholy Players, and stage managed and produced for Downstage Theatre Company. Sarah was the recipient of The Greta Minsky Prize for Stage Management in May of 2021 and can't wait to continue to learn throughout PT's 2021-2022 season.

Daniel Gary Busby (Music Director) has made a varied career as pianist, singer, conductor, teacher, administrator, philanthropreneur, and music critic. A versatile conductor. Dr. Busby's theatrical credits span both the musical theater and operatic genres—from Stephen Schwartz's Godspell to Igor Stravinsky's The Rake's Progress. He has conducted throughout Europe, and South America. With a career that spans 30+ years and has had global reach, he is equally fluent in genres of cabaret, traditional musical theatre, new musical work, opera, drama and comedy. He has been a regular musical fixture at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Los Angeles Civic Light Opera, and universities like USC, UCLA, and UC Irvine, where he served as department chair. He is thrilled to make his debut with Perseverance Theater in this production of *Fun Home*.

Rob Cohen (Guitar) This is Rob's 12th production with Perseverance; he has most recently served as Musical Director for Perseverance Theatre's productions of the Musicals *Guys and Dolls*, and *Chicago!* Mr. Cohen is the 2021-22 recipient of the City's Kathy Kolkhorst Ruddy

Award for Achievement in the Arts, in the "Artist of the Year" category. His composition *Dance for Mixed Quintet in Uncertain Times*, will be performed later this year in the Con Brio *Small Wonders* Chamber Concert. He has composed and recorded soundtracks for documentary films that have actually seen the light of day, and has written and arranged tunes for Jazz Combo that have been filmed and televised on KTOO's 360TV, and have been performed at the Spenard Jazz Festival in Anchorage. Mr. Cohen makes his living teaching a wide variety of instruments to students of all ages at his downtown studio. Rob is enjoying his first stint on guitar for a Perseverance show, and he would like to give props to Music Director Daniel Gary Busby for his expertise, ability, and friendship.

Iman Corbani (Scenic Designer) is an international multidisciplinary artist, scenographer, storyteller, and idea generator. Her practice ranges from solo gallery installation to collaborations in film, television, opera, theatre, dance, and experimental live performance. Whether she is creating large kinetic sculptures for the stage or historically realistic settings for film, her goal is to give voice to important stories and leave an audience deeply engaged. Iman's recent research has been in sustainable design and construction methods toward a goal of zero waste. She holds a BFA in Design for Theatre from Concordia University in Canada and an MFA in Design and Technology at The University of Texas at Austin.

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Paul Cotton (he/ him) (Reeds) is native of Southern California and an established performer and instructor in woodwinds. Audiences have heard him play around the world in such prestigious venues such as Carnegie Hall, Seoul Performing Arts Center, Nixon Library, Musical Arts Center in Bloomington, Carpenter Center, and numerous university campuses. Paul is also a member of the Catalyst Wind Collective, a professional wind ensemble established in 2021 dedicated to providing new music to the Southern California community through diverse programming and musicianship. Bringing his spirit for competition, he has won numerous international and national competitions and was featured as a guest soloist with orchestras such as Redlands Symphony Orchestra. Paul is committed to fostering an inclusive environment for all his students. He encourages teaching in various music styles such as classical and jazz performances. Paul received his Bachelor's in Music (BM) at California State University, Long Beach, and his Master's in Music (MM) in Performance

at Indiana University. His teachers include Dr. Otis Murphy, James Barrera, and Jay Mason. Hali Duran (Choreographer) studied at the International Ballet School, Colorado Conservatory of Dance, and the University of Colorado, Boulder. Notable local production credits include directing for La Liberazione di Ruggiero dall' isola di Alcina and Juneau's Got Talent, choreography for Climate for a Cool Planet, West Side Story, Next to Normal, Whale Song, Peter and the Starcatcher, and Sweeney Todd, was a movement coach for Chad Deity and The Winter Bear, and was a performer in productions of A Wolf Called Romeo, Guys and Dolls, Chicago!, and Princes Sophia. She is currently studying at Intimacy Directors and Coordinators and is proud to be a board member of Juneau Dance Theatre and the New JACC Partnership Board.

Franz Felkl (Violin/Viola) was born and raised in Juneau. He started his violin studies with Guo Hua Xia at age four and continued his studies in high school with Linda Rosenthal. Franz received a BS in Violin Performance and a Bachelor of Music Education K-12 from the University of Alaska Fairbanks. In 2012 he won the Fairbanks Symphony Orchestra's Concerto Competition. As an educator he has



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
worked as a coach in a chamber music setting for young artists, taught at music camps for young musicians, and worked with the Fairbanks Youth Symphony Orchestras. From 2016 to 2019, Franz was the second violinist in the Amernet String Quartet, Ensemble-in-Residence at Florida International University. Franz has moved back to Juneau to teach violin privately and also has been appointed concertmaster of the Juneau Symphony.

Brita Fagerstrom (Medium Alison/The Susan Deys) is a Juneau-born artist with a passion for innovative storytelling. Returning to this cherished project two years later felt like a harrowing endeavor, but she is humbled to be back with this incredible cast and crew and to finally finish what they started. Brita graduated with her BFA in Musical Theatre from Sam Houston State University. She got her start here at Perseverance Theatre, performing in various STAR Programs, Young Company, and Mainstage shows over the past 15 years. Previous productions at other institutions include The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time (Siobhan), for which she received a Kennedy Center National Award for Distinguished Performance, and her Irene Ryannominated performance in *Clybourne Park* (Bev/Kathy). Juneau Drag fans might recognize her as local Drag King "Roman Wilde". She would like to thank Hannah Wolf for her faith and patience, as well as her beloved family and friends for their love and support over the years.



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Liz Hanley (Violin/Viola) is a Brooklyn based violinist, fiddle player, singer and composer. Hanley was trained in classical violin and voice, steeped in Irish and American folk traditions and tumbled in the rock n roll dryer. Vents Magazine states "Liz Hanley is a singer with the sort of crystal-clear, instantly ingratiating voice that has always been a hallmark of progressive folk-rock" and Irish Music Magazine write "Liz Hanley has that uncanny knack and the distinctive voice to reawaken our interest in the familiar..." Hanley has toured globally and recorded with groups such as Frogbelly and Symphony, Mick Moloney and the Green Fields of America and Emanuel and the Fear.

Mike Inwood (Lighting Designer) is overjoyed to finally be able to realize his design for *Fun Home* in Juneau, after two years of waiting! Past Perseverance credits include Franklin (also with Hannah Wolf), and God of Carnage. Other pre-pandemic credits include productions with Signature Theatre, Playwrights Horizons, Ars Nova, The Arden, Actors Theatre of Louisville, Opera Philadelphia, BAM, and the Hudson Valley Shakespeare Festival. His design work has been recognized with an Emmy Award for his lighting of NBC Sports' coverage of the Vancouver Winter Olympic Games, and DDI Magazine's Winning Windows Award for his lighting of the Macy's Christmas Windows at their flagship store in New York City. www.mikeinwood.com

Dale McFarlin (Drums) is thrilled and honored yet again to be on the Perseverance Theatre main stage! Besides drumming in various incarnations of musical expression, Dale is likely to be out in nature, mountain biking, building trails, swimming, hiking, traveling, dreaming of endless

possibilities, and spending cherished time with his beloved wife Florence and two children; Zhuji and Fiona. Dale is especially excited to have the opportunity to perform on stage for the first time with his daughter Fiona, who plays Small Allison! Fiona McFarlin (Small Allison) is excited for her debut performance on stage with Perseverance Theatre!
